Decrease the heat island effect, especially in areas with the highest vulnerability






Progress on fleet electrification

- Replaced 30 vehicles with hybrid in 2021
 - 51 hybrids, 4 EVs in fleet
- Expanded to 10 fleet charging spots
- Partnerships established
- Recognized with Green Fleet award


Key metrics

- 50% hybrid and 20% electric for entire light duty fleet by 2030
- Achieve net zero emissions by 2050



Driving towards fleet electrification in 2022 and beyond

- Add at least 17 more EVs in 2022
- Expand charging stations and motor pool access
 - Partner with Facility Services to offer 40 more charging spots in 2022
 - Optimize fleet for Future Ready Hennepin
- Seek legislative help for market availability challenges




Light duty fleet transition





Reducing vehicle miles traveled

- Supporting the buildout of planned transit routes
- Expanding safety and multi-modal upgrades
- Updating the county's Complete Streets Policy
- Collaborate with transportation partners to advance regional greenhouse gas reduction goals



Key metrics

 Reduce vehicle miles traveled beyond state goal of 20% reduction by 2030

Climate action strategy Getting to a zero-waste future

- Advance anaerobic digestion
- Develop an operational plan to map Hennepin County to a zero-waste future
- Prevent food waste and expand food rescue
- Improve access to recycling and organics services in multifamily locations



Key metrics

• Recycle 75% of waste and send zero waste to landfills by 2030



Climate action strategy Increase the resilience of the built environment and protect natural resources

- Increase the tree canopy
- Acquire and restore conservation easements
- Focus on sub-watershed work by deepening partnerships



Key metrics

- Plant 1 million trees by 2030 through partnerships with cities, Three Rivers Park District, and other community partners
- Acquire 6,000 additional acres of conservation easements by 2040

- Convening an Anti-Displacement Workgroup
- Creating jobs through contracting and labor force goals
- Advancing green jobs
- Utilizing the Race Equity Impact Tool
- Facilitating community-driven solutions
- Expanding educational and employment opportunities for students of color
